| Grammar and Punctuation | In Year 2, children are developing simple sentences into more complex ones. They use expanded noun phrases to extend their descriptions and begin to explore more imaginative vocabulary. They use an increasing range of punctuation including possessive apostrophes, commas in a list, exclamation and question marks. As the year progresses, they begin to proof-read and edit their sentences to check that they make sense and are punctuated correctly as well as editing to improve their work.
